Key Accomplishments in 2015

- Elevated national, regional, and international visibility including appearances in national periodicals and a television program. Within the Waldorf international community, our teachers attended international conferences in Goetheanum in Dornach, Switzerland and the XII Latin American Congress of Waldorf Education in Cali, Colombia.
- Increased enrolment by 30% since 2014 and graduated the third 6th grade class since inception.
- Invested in teacher education through trainings, most notably the Waldorf Teacher Training in the Anthroposophical Development Center in Cuernavaca, Morelos, Mexico.
- Continued to engage with the local community through family workshops and key partnerships with organizations like the Konojel Community Center, a local nonprofit that combats chronic malnutrition and endemic poverty in Guatemala.

In February, a group of educational professionals visited us ias a part of a training driven by Lund University (Sweden) and funded by the Swedish International Cooperation. Part of their training activities included visiting Guatemalan schools to inspect the Rights of the Child. Escuela Caracol was the only school selected nationwide for their visit! In July, four of our teachers attended the XII Latin American Congress of Waldorf Education, which was held in the city of Cali, Colombia. Click here to read more.




